JUST WHAT IS COLD BREW COFFEE? BY LUKE HUGHES, APOTHEOS ROASTERY

Cold brew coffee has been on the rise for the past few years. It's been steadily growing year after year, with many industry experts claiming that it could grow from a \$35 million industry in 2018 to an \$85 million industry by 2025. Despite the proliferation of cold brew coffee, many people still don't fully understand the differences between hot brew coffee, iced coffee, and cold brew coffee.

The differences between hot and cold brew coffee are very simple. Hot brewing coffee relies on using hot water to extract the flavor and caffeine from the coffee bean into a drinkable cup of coffee within minutes. Cold brew, on the other hand, requires that you steep the beans in room temperature or cold water between 12 to 24 hours. While cold brew coffee does take significantly longer to make than hot brew coffee, the process helps ensure that three amino acids are not stripped away from the bean and into your cup of coffee. The aforementioned amino acids are the culprits responsible for making hot brew bitter (What gives the coffee its "bite").

The cold brew process makes sure that your cup of coffee is more "bean-forward" so that all you can detect are the tasting notes of the coffee beans present in the blend, with almost no acidity. This lack of acidity also helps us sweeten and flavor our cold brew coffee with less sugar and less cream so that your beverage has a lower caloric content than a similar tasting hot brew latte or iced coffee.

Iced coffee, while served cold, is not actually cold brew. It is exactly what its name claims it is... Hot coffee that has been chilled with ice. Therefore, despite appearing like it's very similar to cold brew coffee, it actually still possesses the three amino acids responsible for making coffee bitter. Again, this is why many iced coffees come overloaded with sugar and

cream, in an effort to mask the acidic nature of the beverage. Pictured above: Apotheos' newly

There has been a statewide shelter-in-place order issued. Here are few things you need to know

Q: When does it start and how long does it last?

A: The order took effect at 6 p.m. Friday April 3rd and continues through April 13th. (it could be extended).

Q: Can I still leave the house?

A: Yes. It allows Georgians to leave the home to buy groceries, purchase medical equipment, go outside to exercise, respond to emergencies, head to doctor's appointments, or travel for work at businesses or nonprofits that comply with other restrictions

Q: Can I still go outside to exercise?

Yes. There are no limits on exercise, so long as social distancing is employed.

Q: Can I still go to church or my house of worship?

A: The order permits residents to visit places of worship, so long as social-distancing guidelines and other restrictions are followed. However attending church and funeral services are not allowed.

Q: What about restaurants?

A: Dine-in service at restaurants and social clubs is no longer permitted, except for eateries at hospitals, nursing homes and long-term care facilities. Takeout, curbside pickup and delivery are still allowed.

Q: What is closed?

A: The order mandates the closure of gyms, fitness centers, bowling allies, theaters, live performance venues, amusement parks, hair designers, beauty shops, cosmetology schools, barbershops and massage therapists. Bars and nightclubs have previously been shut down.

WHY WE SAY WHAT WE SAY..

William Shakespeare expected that his readers would know exactly what he meant, even though he created many new words and phrases. Throughout his many works he created not one, not 100, but over 1000 new words.



Some people claim that he created over 2000.

Shakespeare created words like BANDIT, CRITIC, and SWAGGER which are still commonly used today. He also created the words LACKLUSTER, LONELY, DWINDLE, and DAUNTLESS. One of his words, FRIENDING, fell out of favor until people began to use it in reference to Facebook.

Other words of his, such as INCARDINE (meaning bright crimson), SLUG-A-BED (someone who sleeps in), KICKY-WICKY (housewife), DISPONGE (rain), BUBUKLES (adult acne), and CO-MART (covenant) have not stood the test of time. One of his made-up words, ROOKY, has an unknown meaning,

though it likely means a tree full of crows. ASSASSINATION was once thought to have been invented by Shakespeare but in fact wasn't. Assassination dates back to at least 1572, when Shakespeare was just eight years old. Another word that he is sometimes falsely credited with creating is **UNCOMFORTABLE** which actually dates back to at least 1534.

CITY OF KENNESAW FACILITY CLOSINGS & EVENT CANCELATIONS

The following departments will accept payment over the phone: Building & Construction – 770-429-4554; City Clerk – 770-424-8274; Finance – 770-424-8274 (the \$3 fee for over the phone payments will be waived during this time)

To contact the Police Department, please use the non-emergency line (770-422-2505). In case of emergency, please dial or text 911.

City staff continues to monitor recent reports and information on COVID-19 provided by the CDC and the DPH.

The public is encouraged to visit City's website at www.kennesaw-ga.gov/covid-19 for information and updates.

CITY OF KENNESAW SANITATION UPDATE

No garbage or recycling left outside of the containers will be recovered. All material must be inside container in order to be picked up.

Until further notice, the City has suspended all bulk pick up and issuance of all tree removal permits unless the tree poses an immediate threat to life or property.

Residential Yard Waste Collection Service will be suspended effective April 6th and we will advise when yard waste collection service will resume.

Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park, in response to Guidelines issued by the Centers for Disease Control and the Georgia Department of Public Health, has closed its operations to support federal, state, and

ESTATE PLANNING IN TIMES OF CRISIS BY ERIKA ORCUTT, ORCUTT LAW

The situation we find ourselves is unprecedented

and challenging in many ways. For many, times of uncertainty and crisis make us realize that we have not adequately planned for a health or financial emergency, or death. And while that realization may cause us additional worry or anxiety, the good news is that it is not too late to make a plan and get the legal documents you need to protect yourself and your family. Our health is currently at the forefront of our

thoughts. The main legal documents for handling health-related concerns are the Advance Directive for Healthcare and HIPAA Authorization. An Advance Directive for Healthcare allows you to appoint an agent as your healthcare power of attorney and directs your agent to make healthcare decisions and communicate those decisions to your healthcare providers. It also allows you to express your end of life choices if you are terminally ill or in a permanent state of unconsciousness and you are likely to die in a short period of time. A HIPAA Authorization allows your loved ones to get access to your medical records from your

healthcare providers. For financial, business, and day-to-day matters, a General Durable Power of Attorney is the document needed to appoint an agent to act on your behalf to manage your affairs while you are alive but unable to handle them yourself. Durable means that it is effective even if you are incapacitated. The document can be written to be effective immediately or when you are determined by your doctor to be incapable of handling your own affairs

The Last Will and Testament ("will") is the document where you appoint an executor to manage your affairs (also known as your estate) after your death. It also allows you to appoint a guardian for minor children. You can specify who gets your real and personal property upon your death, and you can disinherit people who would otherwise be entitled to your property under state law.

There are other documents that can be used to transfer assets upon death, such as a trust, but the documents listed here are the basic documents that one should have in place. If you do not have these essential documents, please contact an estate planning attorney because do-it-yourself documents may not be current or legally enforceable. HR 748 was signed into law on Friday. It is called the CARES ACT (Coronavirus Aid Relief and Economic Security Act) This bill is challenging to navigate and thankfully many venues are putting out information about the available loans for businesses. PRESIDENTIAL PREFERENCE PRIMARY IS **RESCHEDULED FOR MAY 19.**



At the direction of the Georgia Secretary of State's Office, the March 24 Presidential Preference Primary has been rescheduled for May 19.

•Voter registration for the Presidential Primary is reopened. Because the Presidential Primary was postponed and will be conducted with the May 19, General Primary/Non-Partisan Election, the voter registration deadline will now coincide. New and changed voter registration applications can be submitted through April 20, at www.mvp.sos.ga.gov.

•Cobb Elections is mailing an absentee ballot application for the May 19, Primary/ Election to every registered voter older than 60 years of age. Voters in that vulnerable population will receive a printed application to fill-in, sign and send back to our office. Ballots will

STUDENTS CAN PICK UP WEEKLY MEALS ON MONDAYS

Cobb County School District and MUST Ministries have developed a long-term solution to provide students with a five-day supply of breakfasts and lunches at eight school locations on Mondays from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The school locations selected for the meal distributions include schools with more than 50 percent free and reduced lunch populations. Cobb Schools Food Service staff prepares food, purchased by the school district and MUST volunteers distribute that food to students curbside. The meals can only be served to Cobb County students under 18 years of age and students must be physically present.

These weekly breakfast and lunch distributions can be sustained through the rest of the 2019-2020 school year or until Cobb schools reopens.

For the Acworth Kennesaw area the breakfast and lunch school distribution location (11 a.m. -1 p.m., on Mondays) is Acworth Elementary

YOU CAN HELP FROM HOME!

No doubt many of you have been inundated with COVID-19 news and are wondering how to help frontline workers while practicing social distancing. And there is! Sewing Masks for Area Hospitals-

Atlanta (SMAH-Atlanta) is a volunteer effort coordinating thousands of Atlanta-area sewists who are responding to the COVID-19 pandemic with a special set of skills. Sewing groups sew hospital-approved face masks for medical personnel and first responders to help meet the growing demand, and possibly

to help mitigate potential shortages. To date, SMAH-Atlanta has been following CDC and hospital guidelines in order to provide the masks first responders and healthcare workers most need. Generally, the cloth masks sewn by SMAH-Atlanta members go over surgical masks and N95 masks to more safely prolong usage.

SMAH-Atlanta began on March 19,2020 when Gina Livingston, founder of Medium Arts, received a call from a doctor friend who was looking for a potential backup source for face masks if his hospital experienced a shortage. Livingston took the idea to her sewing colleagues, a Facebook group was created, and the requests started coming in by the droves. Now a little more than a week later, thousands of masks have already been sewn, and SMAH was just asked to sew over 7000 more. In addition, we are working with similar groups in other cities around the U.S. to help them successfully do what we have done.

The U.S. Department of Labor has also announced nearly \$100 Million in Dislocated Worker Grants in response to the COVID-19 outbreak. The funds will be available to provide funding assistance in response to large, unexpected economic events that cause significant job losses. These grants will provide eligible participants with both disaster-relief employment and employment and training activities. and afternoon snacks. Use a little creativity to set up a functional home office that will serve you well. I hope these ideas will help you as you



A MOMENT OF **KINDNESS**

BY GREGORY FAVRE It was a moment of kindness by a stranger. It also was a stark reminder that there are still candles of light and cradles of hope in a world currently drowned in darkness and despair.

At least, that's the way it felt to me. I was at the cemetery to change the flowers in the vase at my wife's resting place. Two elderly women were sitting in the same area. We had never met before. I planned to go inside to cut the flowers to size and get water as I have done since my beloved Bea passed away. But the door was locked.

So, I stood yards away from the women to prepare the flowers, respecting their privacy and keeping my social distance. Then, as I turned around, one of the women approached me with an unopened bottle of water for my flowers.

She didn't speak. She just handed me the bottle and walked away as I said: "Thank you.

Yes, in our moments of grieving, for a few brief seconds we violated the social distancing directive, she out of compassion, me out of gratitude for what was in her heart. Scold us if you want. I believe it was a portrait of the humanity that is being magnified millions of times each day around the world.

That kind lady had no way of knowing that the grief soaking my soul was deeper than ever because I had recently returned from my younger brother's funeral, the last of my nine siblings. No way of knowing that her bottle of water washed away some of my inner tears.

My brother Pat and I were separated by five years in age. As life went on, we were also separated by thousands of miles. Our visits were much too few and far between. But the bond we struck growing up and the memories we etched for all the tomorrows will never be erased.

By birth, we become siblings. But it is with love that we become brothers and sisters. And that's why it hurts so much when we lose them.

That kind lady also probably didn't realize that her act of compassion for someone she didn't know and will probably never see again is being magnified across the land today as we face this cruel coronavirus, which threatens lives and livelihoods for millions of our neighbors.

Health care providers, firefighters, police, first responders everywhere, grocery store workers and many more are risking their own health to care for others. Friends are asking if they can bring groceries or meals or medicine. Teachers are teaching from their homes and students are learning online.

Just as it was after 9/11, there will be a new normal when we finally flatten that curve and the virus is defeated. But we really have no idea

when that will transpire. What we have is hope. In the new normal will we still be swimming in the pool of discord and distrust that we have been

swimming in for the past several years? Will our political environment be as mean-spirited as it has been?

Will social media continue to widen our cultural and racial divisions? Will we exist in a state of anxiety instead of one of optimism? Will we continue to taunt each other across the self-painted lines of division? Will we continue to be roused from our sleep by the echoes of violence in our streets?

And there will be so many more questions for us to answer.

In November, we will have the opportunity to help answer those questions when we choose many of our leaders at every level.

Will we choose those who will light candles of light to erase the darkness?

Will we choose those who will fill cradles with hope to erase our fears? Will we choose those who would take a

moment to give us a bottle of water for our flowers?
