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
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THIS AND THAT

COVID-19 VACCINATIONS AT JIM **R. MILLER PARK**

Cobb & Douglas Public Health (CDPH) will begin administering the COVID-19 vaccine to residents in Phase 1A on Thursday, January 7 at Jim R. Miller Park instead of the current site at the Marietta Public Health Center. Phase 1 Aincludes healthcare personnel working on the front lines of the pandemic.

A vaccination appointment system has been created exclusively for Phase 1A participants and they will receive an email from CDPH on how to register after they complete the enrollment form. Participants in Group 1A will be asked for proof of healthcare personnel status and priority will be given to Cobb and Douglas County residents.

Beginning on Tuesday, January 12, CDPH will begin vaccinating residents in Phase 1A+. This phase includes public safety professionals and individuals age 65 years and older. An appointment system for people in Phase 1A+ will be available on the CDPH website beginning on Monday, January 11.

Points to Remember: CDPH will administer vaccines by appointment only. Participants will be asked to remain on-site for 15 minutes for post-vaccination observation. No walk-up appointments are available participants must remain in their vehicle to receive the vaccine and be accessible to clinical staff providing the shot. Residents are also reminded that many healthcare providers, in addition to public health, are gearing up to provide this service across the county next week

CDPH will continue to offer COVID-19 testing at satellite locations throughout Cobb and Douglas Counties. Testing registration may still be found on our website at www.cobbanddouglaspublichealth. org.

WE SAY.

For m a n y centuries, there was no unique English word for the color ORANGE. Instead, allwordsortermsused to describe it were based on other colors. In old English, it was called geoluhread, or "Yellow-Red". In



Middle English, it was referred to as "Between Yellow and Red".

In the 16th century, Portuguese traders brought Oranges from India to Europe. In India Oranges were known as naranga. Even though at first the fruit was referred to as "Golden Apples" in Europe, eventually versions of the original name became popular. In England they became known as "noranges". Over time the "N" at the beginning was lost, creating the word ORANGES, which only referred to the fruit.

So, when did the fruit's name become the name of a color? In the 1590's, Shakespeare made mention of "Orange Tawny" as a color. Tawny was another word for brown, so "Orange Tawny" is a light brown, instead of its own color. Other accounts from the time refer to "the color of an orange". By the 1620's, ORANGE had become its own distinct color.

PURPLE also has an interesting history. In ancient times, purple dye came from a snail that lived near Tyre, in Lebanon. The snail was known as porphura, and the dye was called Tyrian Dye. The dye was difficult to extract from the snail, and because of this it became very valuable. Cloth with Tyrian dye was often worn by royalty. Eventually, porphura was used to refer to the dye, and then later the color. The name was adapted into the Latin word purpura, which eventually became PURPLE.

CITY OF KENNESAW OPENS UPDATED HISTORIC KENNESAW EXHIBIT AT THE DEPOT

The City of Kennesaw's recently updated the exhibit of Historic Kennesaw at the Depot is now open Tuesday through Saturday from 9:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

The Historic Train Depot in Downtown Kennesaw is over 100 years old, but it is not the first such structure to serve the community. Construction on the nearby railroad was completed in 1850, and within a decade, a small, two-story hotel served as the primary stop for passengers. A drawing from the 1860s that appeared in the popular magazine Harpers Weekly also depicted an actual depot in the area, then known as Big Shanty, but the accuracy of the image continues to be debated. At the end of the Civil War, the Lacy Hotel and nearly every other structure in Big Shanty was destroyed, making verification of these early structures difficult.

Recently, the staff of the Southern Museum completed a months long project to update and revitalize the local history exhibit inside the Depot. The displays, which include panels, cases and murals, now explore key topics in the history of the Kennesaw region. These displays include the indigenous peoples who once occupied the land, the impact of the Civil War, the significance of the railroad, the development of Downtown Kennesaw, cultural offerings of the City and the history of the Depot itself. The Depot's bay window now boasts a rotating display of upcoming programs and attractions sponsored by the City of Kennesaw.

Kennesaw has a long and rich history, parts of which are not explored at the Southern Museum given its focus on railroads and the Civil War. The new Historic Kennesaw at the Depot exhibit is inside the Depot and is thus a welcome addition to the cultural legacy of the City

Cross of the Northwest Family YMCA as their Person of the Year. Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, Becky has organized local food pantries, grocery stores, and volunteers to feed over 140,000 people when they needed food relief the most. The Acworth Business Association also awarded the City of Acworth Police Department as the 2020 Business of the Year. Our Acworth Police have always shown their dedication to public service, but their response to the events of last year earned this special recognition. Congratulations to the Acworth Police Department and Becky Cross for these well-deserved honors.

DOYAL HILL PARK DEDICATED

Located adjacent to the Rosenwald School and Acworth Community Center, Doyal Hill Park serves as an outdoor interpretive history area featuring public art honoring Acworth's rich African American History.

The ribbon-cutting and grand opening ceremony of Doyal Hill Park was held on Thursday, December 3. The park is named after Doyal Hill who served Acworth as an Alderman for several years. He was well-loved and an active member of the community and attended Zion Hill Baptist Church. The park is located at 4410 Cherokee Street, between 1885 Grill and the Rosenwald School. Hill Park contains a plaza, sculpture, and interpretive signage documenting our community's rich Black History. 

The Cobb Chamber's Northwest Cobb Area Council, which represents Northwest Cobb's three distinct districts of Acworth, and Kennesaw and West Cobb, has selected three community advocates as 2020 Citizens of the Year: Janet Paulson for Acworth, Cris Eaton-Welsh for Kennesaw, and Mary Chatman for West Cobb. JANET PAULSEN, 2020 ACWORTH CITIZEN OF THE YEAR

Janet Paulsen, a speaker and advocate for domestic violence, is an engaged and active member of the Acworth Community who shows her passion for defending the defenseless in everything she does.

On the night of November 5, 2015, Paulsen's then-husband attempted to kill her by shooting her six times. The shooting left her in critical condition, with a spinal cord injury that paralyzed her right leg. After years of invasive surgeries and grueling physical therapy, she began working as a domestic violence advocate and public speaker. She fought to close a loophole in state law that allowed some domestic violence perpetrators to keep their firearms, a provision that could have prevented her attack. She has spoken at many engagements on domestic violence, and in 2020 was appointed by Governor Kemp to the Georgia Commission on Family Violence.

"Janet Paulsen's survival story and her work to prevent domestic violence is truly inspiring," says Sharon Mason, President and CEO of the Cobb Chamber. "She displays such bravery and commitment to ending domestic violence and she has made a lasting positive impact on her community."

Prior to the attack, Paulsen was heavily involved in her Acworth community, was the Vice President of the Acworth Baseball Association, and was even named Volunteer of the Year by the Georgia Recreation and Park Association.

Since the attack she has made every moment count. Her two sons are football and baseball standouts at Allatoona High School and have both committed to playing baseball at the collegiate level—and she will be there to support them every step of the way.



CRIS EATON-WELSH, 2020 KENNESAW CITIZEN OF THE YEAR

Cris Eaton-Welsh, owner of Eaton Chiropractic, is a crucial fixture within the Kennesaw community. From sitting on the City Council to founding the Swift Kids Running Club and the Kennesaw Grand Prix Race Series, Eaton-Welsh is passionate about promoting a healthy, happy and productive community. 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

EDITOR'S NOTE: While the season of Christmas lights has passed we are sharing the story behind one of the most popular Christmas displays in Kennesaw. Covid squelched a lot of our Christmas activities - visiting light displays was one of the few that we could enjoy without being infected. Many thanks to Amber for taking the time to investigate and write this article.



LIGHTS OF JOY ILLUMINATES KENNESAW BY AMBER ROLAND, NCHS JOURNALIST

Georgia's largest residential Christmas light display lives in the hearts of Kennesaw on Ben King road across the street from the Influencers Church. Since 1988, Lights of Joy's extravagant light show brings overwhelming amounts of holiday excitement to Kennesaw's community each year. Lights of Joy's road front exhibit stretches across 700 feet. With over 750,000 lights, 226 trees, and 60 holly bushes shaped like Christmas trees, Lights of Joy illuminates Ben King road.

Richard and Sherrie Taylor are the masterminds behind Lights of Joy. The couple opens their gates, welcoming thousands of people to fully experience Lights of Joy every year. Mr. Taylor takes care of installation needs, and Mrs. Taylor specializes in light repairs. In 2020 alone, she meticulously repaired 500 strands of lights. Their immersive light display includes an interactive radio station where featured holiday music perfectly syncs to the impressive light presentation. The extraordinary light spectacular surrounds an inside circle where Kennesaw's patrons can walk around with friends, family, and significant others to personally experience the joy created by the Taylors' hard work.

"The more we saw people come and enjoy our display, the more we are motivated to make it bigger and better each year. Many people take a mission trip each year to a foreign country and reach perhaps a couple of dozen people. Our mission is in our front yard. We reached in excess of 21,000 people who walked around our circle in 2019," Mr. Taylor said.

Richard's late mother, Marjorie Hixon, inspired the name "Lights of Joy". From a young age, Hixon represented the epitome of joy, she quickly coined the nickname "My Joy" from her brother Brook. Over the years, Hixon dropped the "My" and became known as Joy. She lived a long life of servitude bringing joy to everyone she encountered. The Taylors decided to honor her legacy and dedicate their beloved light display to Joy Hixon.

After taking in all 750,000 lights, visitors tend to form the common misconception that the Taylors' electrical bill reaches astronomical heights. In reality, Lights of Joy's electrical bill constitutes merely 4% of their total cost, one of the production's smallest components. Behind the scenes, Lights of joy consists of 750 extension cords, 46 circuits of 20 amps each, and approximately 2,000 hours of labor and preparation. All of these factors, juxtaposed with precise planning allows Lights of Joy to run smoothly from November 29th to January 3rd.

Worldwide, 2020 took people on an emotional roller coaster. It often seemed impossible to mask the darkness caused by this unprecedented year. Not even the Taylors could escape 2020's wrath. Just weeks before opening their light display to the public, Hurricane Zeta created problems for Lights of Joy. Two pine trees came crashing down, snapping wires and creating faulty light bulbs on the way. The Taylors refused to let Hurricane Zeta dampen their spirits. They quickly started clean up efforts, and after 90 man-hours of work, Lights of Joy quickly started to resemble its previous glory once again. Georgia's residents faced intense trials and tribulations of their own this year after coping with the extremities of the COVID-19 pandemic. Georgians have been stretched thin and need holiday spirit more than ever. Lights of Joy provides people with the perfect opportunity to safely embrace the holiday spirit.

Lights of Joy continually adapts from year to year. This year, the Taylors clocked 2,000 hours of labor after beginning preparations on July 24th. They decided to add the 'Tunnel of Joy' to this year's extravaganza. The picturesque tunnel creates the perfect photo opportunity for visitors to snap holiday selfies for Instagram, or family photos for Christmas cards. This season, the Taylors also invited talented musicians to become a part of the Lights of Joy Family, they will host a live trombone concert on December 18th and 19th at 7:30 pm.

Each year, Lights of Joy attracts visitors from across the globe. Annually they receive many visitors from Canada and northern states as they pass through Georgia on their way to their Florida winter homes. Last year, ABC's Great Christmas Light Fight featured Lights of Joy, bringing their holiday light spectacular to a national audience.

of Joy, bringing their holiday light spectacular to a national audience. "It is very rewarding for us to see people happy. 'We hope to bring a little joy to everyone we meet'. This is our mission statement, everyone is happy and joyful when they visit our display. They can forget about their problems, even if just for 10 to 20 minutes," Mr. Taylor said.

DRIVING A ROUNDABOUT!

Have you driven on a roundabout? Did you know what to do? Although roundabouts are not very common in Georgia, they have been used extensively in Europe for more than 100 years. Cobb County has only 13 roundabouts but, there are plans for additional roundabouts in the future. Roundabouts are not complicated but can be confusing to drivers experiencing them for the first time.

SO HOW DOES IT WORK?

A roundabout is intended for one way traffic, counter-clockwise. As your car approaches the roundabout, slow down and, remember, you must yield to the vehicles already circling the roundabout. Only enter when it is safe to do so and, remember to keep moving until you exit the roundabout. Using your signals as you exit is courteous and will help alert the driver behind you of your intention.

ARE THERE ADVANTAGES TO ROUNDABOUTS?

According to safety reports, roundabouts reduce crashes by 38 %, injuries by 76%, and fatal injuries by 90% after being converted from traditional intersections. Collisions are slower and tend to happen at more acute angles rather than head-on or rear-end. Other benefits of roundabouts include:

• Less congestion: Shorter commute times for everyone! The Federal Highway Administration says continuous moving traffic helps increase the roadway capacity between 30%-50%.

•Easier for pedestrians: Pedestrians only have to watch traffic in one direction rather than three.

•Better for the environment: less time spent idling at stop signs and red lights equals fewer emissions and less pollution.

While roundabouts can be helpful, they will not work at all intersections. Nothing replaces attentive and lawful driving. Remember, always obey all signs and traffic rules and stay safe.

NEW BIKESHARE PROGRAMS LAUNCH IN CUMBERLAND AND TOWN CENTER

The Cumberland and Town Center Community Improvement Districts (CIDs) are excited to announce new bike-share programs in partnership with Tandem Mobility. The CIDs' previous bike-share provider shuttered operations in May (see earlier releases from Cumberland and Town Center). The relaunch with Tandem Mobility will serve as a one-year pilot program while the CIDs explore a regional bike-share program with additional community partners.

"With the CIDs' investments in our urban trail network, the region has evolved into a hub of greenway and regional trail connections that attracts walkers, joggers, cyclists, and outdoor enthusiasts." said Kim Menefee. "Our bike-shares help make our communities more attractive, more accessible, and more connected. Whether you are heading to a Braves' game or taking a beautiful ride in Town Center, our bikeshares connect you to the best of what Cobb County has to offer. "

"Our vision of a regional system would take these programs to the next level," said Tracy Rathbone Styf, executive director of the Town Center CID. "This collaboration between the Cumberland and Town Center CIDs sets the stage for a more connected Cobb County in the future. Through our membership numbers, we've seen that thousands of users want to ride and ride further, and now they can. We could not be more thrilled to launch our new system and offer this amenity once again."

Tandem Mobility offers technology that improves the user experience for renters. Bikeshare members can rent and return a bike from either program's stations. The previous system allowed riders to rent and return bikes to only one program's stations. Now, riders can use the programs interchangeably, with access to 80 bikes at 12 stations. Users of the new program will be able to ride for free for the first hour. After that, it will be \$3 per hour with a \$24 per day maximum.

The Cumberland and Town Center CIDs took a creative approach for the ribbon cutting of the new program. The relaunch took place as a YouTube premier showing both CIDs' executive directors celebrating the long awaited return of the program.

The Town Center Community Alliance (Alliance), the Town Center CID's nonprofit partner, will manage the Town Center Bikeshare Program. The Alliance leverages the work of the CIDs, Cobb County, and other partners who have invested in a regional trail network to engage community members.

The Cumberland and Town Center CIDs look forward to releasing more announcements in the future regarding Cobb's bikeshare programs. 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
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
